- 1 Article I: The federal government will require Genetically Modified
2 Organisms (GMO) or items containing GMO to have
3 Government GMO labels.
- 4 Article II: GMO's have not been proven to cause harm nor be safe, and
5 for the knowledge of the people buying and consuming products
6 they should have the full knowledge of the contents. The federal
7 government will create labels required to be on products that
8 contain GMO contents.
- 9 Article III: This bill will go into law immediately following its passage
10 by Congress.
- 11 Article IV: The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will oversee the
12 implementation of this bill.
- 13 Article V: All laws in conflict with the legislation are declared null and void
14 upon passage.

A Bill to Eliminate Mandatory Minimum Sentencing

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **ARTICLE I** All mandatory minimum sentences for nonviolent low-level drug crimes,
3 mandatory minimum sentences greater than 10 years, and three strike laws will
4 be hereby abolished.

5 **A.** All prisoners currently sentenced under these mandatory laws shall be re-
6 sentenced under present federal and state codes without any minimum
7 sentencing.

8 **ARTICLE II** **A.** Mandatory minimum sentences are the bare minimum sentences that judges
9 are legally obligated to give for certain crimes, even in instances of extenuating
10 circumstances.

11 **B.** Three strike laws are defined as any law that requires judges to give out a
12 longer sentence than commonly used for a crime that was committed by a
13 person who has been pronounced guilty of two or more felony convictions.

14 **ARTICLE III** This legislation shall go into effect immediately upon passage.

15 **ARTICLE IV** The U.S. Department of Justice will oversee the implementation of this
16 legislation.

17 **A.** All states not in compliance with this legislation will be penalized with a 25%
18 reduction in federal funding until such time that the states have reformed
19 their sentencing to match the new codes.

20 **ARTICLE V.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Bill 314: A Bill to Maintain Current Funding for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) will continue to receive its projected FY 2017 quantity of \$19.285 billion for the 2018 fiscal year. The amount of money appropriated to NASA will remain the same in both FY 2017 and FY 2018.

SECTION 2. The duration of the United States federal government's fiscal year (FY) 2018 will last from October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2018.

SECTION 3. The United States Congress will allocate the aforesaid funding to NASA and will manage the enforcement of this legislation.

SECTION 4. This bill will be implemented immediately after passage.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Restrict Funds for Palestinian Authority

- 1 Article I: No funds available to any Government Department or Agency will be
2 used to fund any United Nations contributions for the Palestinian
3 Authority.
- 4 Article II: The Palestinian Authority is the governing body for the West Bank
5 and Gaza strip, formerly known as the Palestinian National
6 Authority.
- 7 Article III: No waivers for this Law are allowed.
- 8 Article IV: This Law will remain in effect until the Secretary of State certifies in
9 writing to Congress that:
- 10 A. The Palestinian Authority regularly and strongly condemns
11 terrorism.
- 12 B. Has ceased to participate in any economic, educational, cultural, or
13 other boycott of Israel, its citizens, its products, or its services.
- 14 C. Takes tangible steps to dismantle terrorist operations within their
15 land.
- 16 D. Recognizes Israel's right to exist as a Jewish State.
- 17 Article V: This Law will take effect immediately upon passage.
- 18 Article VI: This Law will be overseen by The State Department.
- 19 Article VII: All laws in conflict with this Bill will be declared null and void.

A Bill to Renew the Federal Assault Weapons Ban

- 1 Article I: This bill will renew the Federal Assault Weapons Ban of 1994.
- 2 Article II: An assault weapon is defined as a semi-automatic firearm that reloads
3 through a magazine. The Federal Assault Weapons Ban was a piece of
4 legislation passed in 1994 that denied use and ownership of 18 specified
5 types of assault weapons—as well as revolving cylinder shotguns—
6 throughout the United States, in addition to other military-style features
7 attached to firearms, as per the text of the original bill.
- 8 Article III: Enforcement of this bill will be overseen by the Bureau of Alcohol,
9 Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) within the United States
10 Department of Justice.
- 11 A. As this is a renewal of the Federal Assault Weapons Ban of 1994,
12 enforcement of this bill will operate under the same legal framework
13 as the expired law. This includes preventing the transfer, manufacture,
14 and ownership of given assault weapons—as specified in the text of
15 the original legislation—and high-capacity magazines, with the
16 exception of those already owned prior to the passage of this bill.
- 17 B. Any persons seen or caught in possession of one or more assault
18 weapons will be arrested and taken into custody by law enforcement
19 officers. Suspects will be federally prosecuted.
- 20 Article IV: This bill will be implemented six months upon passage.
- 21 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 1 Article I: The standard deduction on the federal income tax shall be lowered
2 to \$ 5,000 for all taxpayers.
- 3 Article II: Charitable donations shall no longer be counted as tax
4 deductible.
- 5 Article III: The standard deduction is defined as a specific amount of non-
6 taxable income that applies to all taxpayers.
- 7 Article IV: This Bill shall be implemented on September 1, 2016.
- 8 Article V: The Internal Revenue Service shall oversee the implementation
9 of this bill.
- 10 Article VI: All laws in conflict with this Bill shall hereby be declared null and
11 void.
